Mercy in Action

My MiA journey began when my son Daniel decided he would like to actively help impoverished children living in other areas of the world. I must admit that this is not something I had considered doing. However a year later we met Jayne who was preparing for her own trip with MiA and with her help and Daniel's undying enthusiasm, I went ahead and made the applications.

Wherever we went, we were made to feel extremely welcome and the children were all fascinated with Daniel, especially as he was so much bigger than Filipino children of the same age. The children would take Daniel off to play whilst I was shown round and introduced to the staff. The children were not shy at all and they were keen to ask us questions, look at photos I had brought from home and tell me about themselves. They were also very keen to have their photos taken at every opportunity!

Nothing could have prepared me for our first night patrol. I was a little worried on the first night that I was going to lose Daniel as he was surrounded by excited inquisitive children and it was very dark. I needn't have worried as the older boys from MiA took good care of him. This was really the first time on our trip that I fully appreciated the impoverished state that some of the families were living in. Despite our first experiences of night patrol, Daniel and I came to love these times. It was lovely to see the children's excitement and smiling faces when the MiA bus arrived and then to participate in the games, Zumba and distributing food and drink, made for an amazing experience. I enjoyed helping with lessons at home school and at the drop in centre. It was interesting to see how they were taught and quite shocking to see how far behind some of the children were in their education. Daniel also enjoyed it and was even able to help the older boys with their science modules. In return the boys taught Daniel a lot of their language and it wasn't long before he could recognise several words and phrases.

Since our return we have continued to fundraise for the charity and I have recently been appointed as a Mercy in Action ambassador. In March 2018 myself, Julie Robinson, Andrea Williams, Joanne Gurden and Melissa Dachtler will be running the first London Landmarks half marathon for Mercy in Action. Nature Notes

Autumn, " a season of mists and mellow fruitfulness" with golden leaves crunching underfoot. I noticed squirrels busy in the woods picking up the sweet chestnuts to nibble. Squirrels also love acorns and there are some signs that this year might be a bumper year for acorns as the tress are laden with them. Acorns and beech nuts are vital food sources for animals and birds including mice, deer, jays, wild boar and squirrels. The most prolific acorn gatherer is the jay as he can store about three acorns in its gullet and one in its beak, then he hides them under leaves, in cracks in tree bark and in any other handy place. An adult jay can collect up to 5000 acorns in a season.

Traveller's Joy or Old Man's Beard is festooning the hedgerows in bearded glory. The French name for Old Man's beard is "herbe aux greux"- the beggar's or rascal's herb. This is a reference to its use by beggars. They used its acrid sap to irritate the skin to give it a sore and ulcerated look, in order to induce sympathy and perhaps a donation from a passing person.

Wasn't the orange red sun on the 16th spectacular with the surrounding misty yellow clouds? This was caused by the storm Ophelia. Smoke from the wild fires causing havoc in Spain and Portugal and dust and sand from the Sahara were swept into the atmosphere by the storm. The dust particles filtered out blue and violet light allowing only red and orange to shine through resulting in the startling phenomenon. Ian

Thanington Without Parish Council

It has been quite a busy few months for the Parish Council. The main issues with regards to Hilltop's area of the Parish being the constant discussions and battle with Highways over the deteriorating state of our roads and footways.

It seems at long last that the ridiculous situation with the condition of Hollow Lane by the old Oast House is going to be repaired properly towards the end of October. Incredibly after one of our complaints, Highways Inspectors went along to look and their report came back with the finding that there were no potholes. I did offer to drive him up and down the road and to walk him hand in hand past the invisible potholes, but I had no response.

Rather than the inadequate temporary patching which lasts until either it rains or the first lorry goes over it, a programme for permanent road repair works is now being proposed which is great news. Do bear in mind though, these were first promised to be carried out during the Easter period well over a year ago now but never actually happened. We wait with baited breath to see if they carry out the works this time round – Watch this space.

The Parish Council continue to cut and maintain the verges throughout the Parish as Canterbury City Council refuse to do so. We also supplied, installed and continue to maintain the fencing along the elevated footway from New House Lane down to the Oast House. Again CCC flatly refused to carry out these works even though it was acknowledged by all to be a serious safety issue.

We continue to have input on your behalf with planning within our Parish and are asked to recommend our acceptance or objections to the planning department on each and every application.

We continue to oppose and object to the large scale developments that are planned within our area; our particular concerns being the already seriously overflowing existing infrastructure which as we are all aware is at bursting point and will be totally unable to sustain any major increase both in terms of capacity and air quality.

You may have seen a leaflet delivered through your doors recently from the Parish Council combined with the coverage in local media regarding CCC's proposed changes to local governance with the possibility of disbanding our Parish Council to take control themselves. We at the Parish Council are quite worried about this obviously as from past history it would seem that CCC have proved time and time again that they would not be looking after our area at all thus effectively destroying all the good works carried out by the Parish Council over the years.

Your Parish Council meets every second Monday in the month at 7:00pm with meetings mainly held at the Thanington Road Resource Centre. Visitors are welcomed at any of these meetings and would be glad to see you there. Why not come along to one to see what happens?

We hope your summer has been a good one and the coming months will be too.
